Proliferation Threats Today

- Access to dual-use, WMD-relevant, items, technologies, materials & knowledge by select States
- Access by non-state actors/terrorist groups (insider problem)
- Emerging suppliers (states)
- Industry (complicit or ignorant)
- ◆ Inadequate strategic trade controls in transit or transshipment states

Growing fungibility (of dual-use items & technologies)... requires balancing trade with security imperatives

Impact of Globalization

Transnational production & supply chains

- Complex genealogy of firms
- Globalization of factors of production
- Spatially distributed units for sourcing, know-how, production, marketing & distribution

Transnational proliferation trends

- Not import the entire system & therefore risk detection
- But assemble items in bits and pieces
- Then acquire expertise to integrate them

Government - Industry Role in UNSCR 1540

Govt → prevent proliferation & terrorism

Industry → prevent mis-use of its products (including IP)

UNSC R 1540 explicitly recognizes the need for PARTNERSHIP between govt and industry

Emphasis should be on monitoring & managing

- → TRADE AND TECHNOLOGY
- → TRADE IN TECHNOLOGY-EMBEDDED PRODUCTS

Consolidated Screening List

Below is a link to a downloadable file that consolidates export screening lists of the Departments of Commerce. State and the Treasury into one spreadsheet as an aide to industry in conducting electronic screens of potential parties to regulated transactions. In the event that a company, entity or person on the list appears to match a party potentially involved in your export transaction, additional due diligence should be conducted before proceeding. There may be a strict export prohibition. requirement for seeking a license application, evaluation of the end-use or user to ensure it does not result in an activity prohibited by any U.S. export regulations, or other restriction.

Prior to taking any further actions, users are to consult the requirements of the specific list on which the company, entity or person is identified by reviewing the webpage of the agency responsible for such list. The links below will connect you to the specific webpage where additional information about how to use each specific list is contained. These links are also embedded into the file for each listed entity to direct you to the proper website for information about how to resolve the issue. Note that the column on the attached file, which is titled "Source List", indicates which specific consolidated screening list is the source for each entry on the spreadsheet. Blank data fields in the file are not applicable to the consolidated screening list in the "Source List" column.





South Korea: Kosti - assistance to exporters




Housego from the president Dovelopment to date. Structure: Location

Key Recommendations for Governments

Clear procedures & consistent decisions

- 1. Penalties for non-compliance
- 2. Incentives for compliance

Build Awareness through information dissemination

- 1. Multiple channels
- 2. User-friendly resources

Capacity building for compliance

- 1. Through Govt agencies
- 2. Through non-govt experts
 - a. Industry associations
 - b. Technical experts
 - c. Dedicated agency (govt or non-govt)

Key Recommendations for Industry

Understand the rationale & regulations

- 1. Be responsive to outreach events
- 2. Spend staff-time & resources in getting info

Assess own risks & establish risk-mitigation procedures internally

- 1. Investment into your own capabilities
- 2. Proof of due diligence in the event of violation

Provide feedback to government agencies

- 1. On effectiveness of procedures
- 2. Concrete suggestions for improvement
- 3. Voluntary disclosures about
 - a. suspicious customers
 - b. questionable activities of rivals
 - c. own mistakes

Conclusions

- ◆ 1540 should recognize crucial role of industry in
 - technology innovation
 - Generating new uses of existing line of products and services
- Recommend that govts create institutionalized mechanisms to solicit industry feedback
 - On regulations/procedures (Comment period before publishing new guidelines)
 - Simplification of forms and procedures → will expedite & foster routine compliance
- ◆ Consistent recognition of Industry as a partner in international non-proliferation efforts; both operating in a dynamic threat environment
