

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POLITICAL DEVELOPMENTS

Sri Lanka cremations, Editorial, Dawn, 01 March¹

Prime Minister Imran Khan, it has now been reported, spoke to the Sri Lankan president and prime minister on the matter during his recent visit and urged them to respect the sentiments of the Muslims. It was primarily due to the prime minister's persuasion that the Sri Lankan government decided to lift the ban and allow Muslims to fulfil their religious requirements. The news has made international headlines. Mr. Khan deserves praise for taking this initiative and resolving an issue that was deeply troubling for Muslims in another country. What must have helped the Sri Lankan government reverse its order was the fact that the prime minister had a successful tour of the country and was able to generate significant goodwill. It is also safe to assume that Sri Lanka would be happy to have Pakistan on its side on various issues and especially those that figure in international forums. Both Islamabad and Colombo deserve credit for resolving the matter amicably and making it a win-win for all. It is foreign policy wins like these that add gravitas to governance and improve relations between countries. The prime minister has done well and the Muslims of Sri Lanka are better off and relieved due to his initiative.

SC on Senate polls, Editorial, *Dawn*, 02 March²

The Supreme Court has declared in its short order on the reference sent by the president under Article 186 of the Constitution that "The Elections to the Senate of Pakistan are held 'under the Constitution' and the law". The order issued on Monday makes it clear that the election of the Senate is to be held under the Constitution, which means it will be conducted through a secret ballot. The court order is in essence a repudiation of the government's position, and the ordinance it promulgated through the president, that the Senate election should be held with an open ballot. However, there is a twist. The order then proceeds to quote a 1967 judgment "where it has been held that secrecy is not absolute...." From this observation, the Supreme Court then declares that the "Election Commission is required to take all available measures including utilizing technologies, to ensure that the election is 'conducted honestly, justly, fairly and that corrupt practices are guarded against'." This has added an element of ambiguity to the real meaning of the order. Now that the Supreme Court has clearly stated that the mode of voting in the Senate elections is under the Constitution, it would be better if the

political parties brought back the issue for discussion in parliament and legislated electoral reforms, including the mode of voting for the next Senate elections.

The game is on, Zahid Hussain, *Dawn*, 03 March³

While no surprise is expected regarding the provinces, the entire focus is now on the contest for the Islamabad seat. It's the most critical test indeed for a fledgling ruling coalition with a pumped-up opposition alliance trying to snatch a surprise victory. The wheeling and dealing is in full swing to win over disgruntled members of the opposing camps. The prime minister who is rarely seen in parliament has now camped out in his chamber to do some damage control. The Supreme Court's decision on the eve of the Senate election has cost the PTI heavily. The constant rhetoric about buying and selling of votes in the Senate election may have also been a factor in fueling discomfort in the party ranks. It denotes the leadership's lack of faith in its members. In comparison, the opposition PDM appears much more confident despite the fact that it is lacking in numbers. It is also a psychological war that the two sides are engaged in. More interesting is the opposition's upbeat mood over the perception of the establishment's neutrality in these elections. There is also a feeling in the PDM leadership that half the battle is won with the establishment distancing itself from the PTI government.

Sab pe bhaari, Asif Zardari, Najam Sethi, The Friday Times, 05 March⁴

Yousaf Raza Gilani's win in the senate elections against the odds favoring Hafeez Sheikh, has given a resounding fillip to "Sab pe bhaari, Asif Zardari". Not only has Mr. Zardari increased the PPP's tally in the Senate to 20 seats and the PDM's to 53, including the Chairmanship if required, he now has the upper hand within the PDM in devising a strategy to oust Imran Khan because he has proved his mettle. Mr. Zardari took full advantage of the visible disgruntlement within the PTI to stitch up a dozen or so MPAs from Sindh to get an extra seat in the Senate, likewise by adding critical MNA votes in Islamabad to edge Yousaf Raza Gilani past the post. He also suggested that, under desperate SOS pressure from Imran Khan, some last minute discreet phone calls by the Miltablishment to errant MNAs may have served to reduce his candidate's winning lead. The Miltablishment has invested heavily in the current hybrid system under Imran Khan. In particular, two of its leaders have personal stakes in its longevity. But Imran Khan's dismal performance has left the Miltablishment gasping for breath to salvage its pride and credibility after Nawaz Sharif's stinging attacks on its

leadership. If it sticks to Imran, it will be targeted and degraded by the PDM, which is against its longer-term institutional interests. If it doesn't, it will have to seek out options to keep both Imran and Nawaz at bay. That won't be easy, considering that between the two of them they control an overwhelming majority of the popular vote. But it's not impossible either. The Miltablishment has a well-trodden history of both seizing power when the moment is ripe and retreating when there is a popular upsurge against it.

Vote of confidence, Editorial, *Dawn*, 08 March⁵

Imran Khan's decision to take a vote of confidence from parliament today is a bizarre move with a fairly obvious outcome. It will mark the first time a prime minister has undertaken such an exercise after the passage of the 18th Amendment. The Senate shock jolted him and the party to such an extent that the latter feels compelled to publicly affirm its faith in the prime minister. The confidence vote, too, is an indication of this mistrust. Unfortunately for Mr. Khan, despite taking such a measure, the reality that there are people in his party who defected and voted for his rivals will not change? It would have been better if the prime minister left the subject of a no-confidence motion to the opposition, and then consolidated his position. Instead of focusing his energy on a show of bravado, Mr. Khan ought to reflect on the future of legislative business. The way to prove his strength in parliament is by getting bills passed something that has proved to be a challenge time and again. This entire effort appears to be a remedial attempt by Mr. Khan to put salve on the wounds inflicted on his party's morale by the stunning upset on the Islamabad Senate seat.

Buzdar in or out? Editorial, Daily Times, 10 March⁶

When handpicked by PM Khan in August 2018, Sardar Usman Buzdar was to embody the common man's empowerment. In spite of rampant skepticism within his party, he was touted to be in the best position to understand problems of the neglected areas. Three years down the road and Punjab's chief minister has taken a steep climb down. Whether he is finally shown the door, speculations about his imminent ouster are one the rise. Again. Some claim that the establishment is not too happy with Punjab's governance but the skipper is still standing behind his Wasim Akram Plus; with a keen eye on his interests. However, no amount of criticism on his capacity has been successful in paving the way for change. It is quite clear that this little known

politician from Barthi still enjoys the limelight of the forces that be. Despite signs of visible decline in his promising portfolio, he is still turning the wheels of the most important province however slow he wishes. PML-Q's Pervaiz Elahi was an administrative giant who invested heavily in bringing about visible signs of development and service delivery. Still, the Chaudhry's are in no mood to see Buzdar go. Could it be the CM's unflinching support for projects in their strongholds-no matter how modest-or his submission to their power-sharing formula that has helped him curry favours with the PML-Q.?

Rift in the PDM, Editorial, Dawn, 18 March⁷

Resigning from the assemblies was a 'nuclear option' in which the PPP always had the most to lose among its allies in the Pakistan Democratic Movement. After all, it alone of the component parties has a stake in the current set-up, including the Sindh government. Now that push has come to shove, the PPP's reluctance to take that step has become crystal clear. The alliance on Tuesday announced the postponement of its March 26 antigovernment long march owing to differences over submitting the resignations. Certainly, the rift in the alliance does not make for good optics, and government ministers are having a field day proclaiming the 'demise' of the PDM, once again. Moreover, while the opposition alliance is well within its rights to call for early elections, to do so halfway through the PTI's tenure can be considered unreasonable, even a non-starter, given that poll rigging allegations are par for the course in this country. *Compounding the challenge*, the establishment for its own reasons is evidently still backing the same horse. Without its support, effecting a change in the political set-up is extremely unlikely.

Opposition alliance in trouble, Editorial, *Dawn*, 23 March⁸

The PDM is in trouble. If the dispute over resignations symbolized the first crack within the opposition alliance, the disagreement over which party has claim on the office of the leader of the opposition in the Senate poses a graver threat to the unity of the alliance. After the defeat of PDM candidates in the election for chairman and deputy chairman of the Senate, it was expected that the scheduled long march would get a booster shot. Instead, the opposite happened. The PPP made it as clear as possible that it was not interested in resigning from the assemblies, saying that was the action of last resort and

the time was not opportune for it. The open and very public spat between the PPP and PML-N over who gets the post of leader of the opposition threatens to undo much of the goodwill generated by the opposition parties since the formation of the alliance six months ago. The war of words raging between the two parties has ominous overtones for what lies ahead for PDM.

A fresh start? Editorial, Dawn, 25 March⁹

Efforts are clearly afoot to de-escalate tensions in South Asia, with most of the action taking place behind the scenes, though some aspects of the nascent process are being highlighted for public consumption. The Pakistan Day message received by Prime Minister Imran Khan from his Indian counterpart Narendra Modi certainly comes under the heading of public diplomacy, designed to bring down the temperature in the region. The need right now is to move forward with guarded optimism as hawks on both sides who thrive on confrontation may well try and derail matters. The next opportunity for a high-level exchange will come in Tajikistan's capital Dushanbe, where both states' foreign ministers are due to attend the Heart of Asia meeting later this month. That meeting may point the way forward for the peace process. As a former Pakistani foreign minister and an Indian expert have written in this paper, if there is seriousness of purpose, everything standing in the way of peace including Kashmir can be resolved. This latest opportunity for peace must not be lost.

ECONOMIC ISSUES

Generous support, Editorial, *Daily Times*, 16 March¹⁰

Pakistan is in urgent need of a helping hand from its Gulf friend. Again. As the deadline to return the UAE's goodwill loan of USD 1 billion is upon us, the finance ministry has reached out to Crown Prince Muhammad bin Zayed Al Nayhan for a one-year rollover. Given the brotherly relations between the two states, Islamabad is pretty optimistic about retaining this cash deposit. And why wouldn't it? Returning such a huge amount would, surely, incur economic damages-that know no bounds-on any economy, let alone one catastrophically shrunk by the pandemic. As per a World Bank estimate, Pakistan's real GDP growth nosedived to negative 0.38 per cent in FY 2019-**20.** Positive gains aside, Pakistan is still not in a position to have any pressure on the rupee. The UAE's financial assistance had been roped in to buy the

Khan administration some time to negotiate a deal with the IMF. But given the 13-months long delay in the third loan tranche of over \$500 million (the deal was salvaged just recently), there still remains a shortage of cash influx. As Pakistan gears up for the fiscal, monetary and structural framework required by the IMF programme, fears of ruining the much-celebrated bullish market sentiment hang heavy. Any such negative development would upend the recent economic gains. While fruitful negotiations with the UAE would help quash monetary panic in the short-term, it is high time Pakistan realizes why it keeps finding itself with a desperate begging bowl at other countries' doorsteps.

Skyrocketing food prices, Editorial, Daily Times, 18 March¹¹

The runaway prices of food items have become the new normal in the country. This consistent pressure on the shoestring budget of low-income groups has left the government with egg on its face. Though it continues its fight against the inflation mafias, the resounding success (lowest level in two years in January) does not resonate as loudly. As Muslims in Pakistan are getting ready to welcome Ramadan celebrations, the mounting prices of many essential commodities add to their stress. Already, many have been speaking about how expensive food would make the coming month incredibly tough for them. No matter how well-intended Islamabad's resolve may be, prices cannot be controlled without effective market governance. Unscrupulous hoarders and self-serving millers need to be acted against, that too, in the earliest. More devastating is the impact of middlemen on the food chain who add considerable cost to the retail prices. We have a big farmer working as Food Security Minister. Why is he missing in action? Shouldn't his expertise have averted the food crises being rammed down our throats? A workable strategy to develop the country's production capacity as well as getting the better of mafia havens is the need of the hour. After all, we are an agroindustrial country and no controversy can be a bigger blot on our escutcheon than ones involving food.

Monetary policy, Editorial, Dawn, 22 March¹²

The State Bank's decision to keep an easy monetary policy in place is a clear sign that it doesn't want to upset the ongoing economic recovery. The decision signals the bank's willingness to hold steady interest rates in the near term to support recovery until it becomes "more durable" and the economy returns to full capacity. Yet the bank has kept its doors open for "measured and gradual adjustments" to achieve mildly positive real interest rates going

forward. The State Bank's dovish monetary stance is in line with broader market expectations, and the global trend of central banks supporting recovery from the effects of the coronavirus. It is, therefore, safe to assume that the low-interest-rate environment will continue for a while despite revival of the IMF programme and higher world oil and food prices fuelled by stronger global growth projections that could feed into domestic inflation. However, risks remain because of the emergence of a virulent third wave of Covid-19, plus uncertainty regarding inflation and growth outlook. So far, inflationary risks have been outweighed by the uncertainty spawned by the pandemic in monetary policy determination. But for how long? The government's failure to tackle the supply-side factors fuelling inflation could compel the bank to reverse its accommodative stance.

BRI alternative? Editorial, The Express Tribune, 30 March¹³

US President Joe Biden recently pushed a competitor to China's massive Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), a move that could further heighten the trade war with China that he inherited from former president Donald Trump. CPEC, incidentally, is a tiny part of the BRI the \$60-odd billion valuation of all CPEC projects is barely 1% of the total estimated cost of the BRI. That alone should give an idea of the scale of the BRI and what any Western alternative would have to entail. Biden has suggested that the proposed alternative led by "democratic" countries presumptively the Western countries that are at odds with China for various trade and political reasons. The US and several other Western nations have shown concern over the BRI for a while. Unfortunately, while some of their concerns are worthy of debate such as the terms of lending to various countries many are just examples of the pot calling the kettle black. The truth is that China is just beating the Western powers at their own game. Any Western competitor for CPEC would require agreement between several countries just to get it off the ground, making it a non-starter at least in terms of scale. Then there are issues concerning what China gets out of BRI versus what an alternative would offer the West.

Finance minister's removal, Editorial, Dawn, 31 March¹⁴

This election, as it turned out, was a do-or-die one for Mr. Sheikh. As adviser on finance, he had been barred by the decision of the Islamabad High Court to chair important forums such as the National Finance Commission and the Economic Coordination Committee. The court in its decision had declared that unelected advisers could not perform executive functions and head

ministries. To bypass this restriction, the government had made Mr. Sheikh a minister through an ordinance. However, the ordinance was set to lapse in June, which meant that either he had to get elected before that, or pack his bags. The government considered finding another way to get him into the Senate but, as is clear from his sacking, it decided it was not worth the cost. For PTI, the liabilities that Mr. Sheikh now carried outweighed the assets he had brought to the job. It was, therefore, strange, and a bit unfortunate, that it decided to rather ungraciously throw Mr. Sheikh under the bus. Government spokespersons were tutored to say that Mr. Sheikh had been sent packing because he could not control the spiraling inflation in the country. Had this been the case, the government would not have cashed its chips in a bid to get him elected. If Mr. Sheikh won, it is reasonable to expect that he would have stayed on in the job regardless of the inflation rate. Hafeez Sheikh deserved a better send-off than the one he was given. The cabinet reshuffle that appears to be in the offing will indicate the priorities of the prime minister for the rest of his term.

SECURITY SITUATION

Another 'encounter', Editorial, *Dawn*, 12 March¹⁵

How many 'encounter' killings will there be before murderous lawenforcement personnel are brought to book? On Sunday, a Sindh University student, Mohammed Irfan Jatoi, was gunned down in Sukkur in an ostensible encounter with the cops, who described him as a "notorious dacoit" wanted in connection with several crimes. Except, Irfan's friends and social media activists denounced this version as a pack of lies, claiming he had been taken away from the campus on Feb 10 by the police and remained in their custody until they killed him almost a month later. Following the public furore, IG Sindh Mushtaq Mahar ordered an inquiry. The investigation could bring to an end the impunity with which extrajudicial killings are committed in this country, especially in Sindh and Punjab, or it could turn out to be yet more lip service to the notion of accountability for trigger-happy law-enforcement officials. The case bears striking similarities to one that caused a furore some three years ago that of Naqeebullah Mehsud who was gunned down along with three other individuals in a deserted farmhouse in Karachi's Malir district on Jan 13, 2018.

Attack on Rangers, Editorial, Dawn, 17 March¹⁶

Monday's bomb attack targeting paramilitary personnel in Karachi left one Rangers official martyred and injured several people including members of *the force. Though* it is too early to say whether this incident signals the return of militancy to Karachi, the group that has claimed responsibility for the attack has also been behind several previous such incidents in the city. Though the previous attacks were foiled by a rapid and effective response from security forces, there is still a need for better intelligence gathering and vigilance. CCTV footage and evidence from the attack site should offer some clues to investigators, who must dedicate resources to getting more information in order to thwart the group's future plans. The BLA time and again has signaled its intent to attack both security forces and Chinese-backed projects, citing its grievances with China's involvement in Balochistan. BLA is part of a handful of armed resistance groups in Balochistan who for years have run an insurgency in the name of fighting for a greater share of resources in the province. Alongside counterterrorism operations, it is important for the authorities to address the grievances of disgruntled Baloch people to put an end to the bloody militancy that has hurt both the economy and the objective of peace in the country.

Restoration of trilateral train service, Editorial, Jang, 02 March¹⁷

After a hiatus for over a decade, Pakistan, Iran and Turkey have decided to resume trilateral international container train service from 4 March. The train would start from the Lahore dry airport, pass through Quetta, Tehran and finally would reach Istanbul. It would cover a distance of 6,500 kms in 275 hours. The train was started on 14 August 2009. It had to be stopped because of terror activities in the country. The purpose for running goods and passenger trains between the three countries is to implement the agenda of the Regional Development Cooperation (formed 1964). If the agenda is implemented successfully, it would help in promoting tourism. The train service needs to be restored. The service would promote cooperation in agriculture, industries and businesses. In the coming days, under CPEC, the service would be useful.

Decision to seek vote of confidence welcome step, Editorial, *Daily Ausaf*, 05 March¹⁸

The defeat of finance minister Hafeez Sheikh by five votes to joint candidate of PDM, Syed Yousaf Raza Gillani has shocked the government. The ruling alliance got 16 less votes than expected. The government has announced that Imran Khan would seek a vote of confidence in the national assembly. The ministers in the government accused the election commission for not holding free and fair elections. The result of the Islamabad general seat has given rise to the question whether the government enjoys a majority. That is why the government is throwing allegations of horse-trading. In fact the government has tried to target the election commission directly. It is not appropriate in any sense. The election commission has been given authority by the constitution of Pakistan to act at its own. GB as a provisional province, Editorial, Daily Dunya, 10 March¹⁹

GB assembly has passed a unanimous resolution for seeking a provisional provincial status for GB from the Government of Pakistan. The assembly demanded for a fair representation of GB in the parliament and other national institutions. An amendment should be made in the constitution to meet the demands of GB, the resolution read. The demand is in line with the statement made by the minister for Kashmir Affairs and Gilgit-Baltistan during the elections in GB last November that the PTI led government had decided to make GB a provisional province. The first major development in this regard happened when the government and the opposition both agreed in September 2020 that GB should be given provisional provincial status. The third development was the setting up a 12-member committee by none other than Prime Minister Imran Khan himself in December for seeking recommendations in this regard. The committee included the minister for

Kashmir Affairs and GB, Chief Minister GB, Attorney General of Pakistan, federal secretaries of finance and defence, and representatives from foreign affairs, parliamentary affairs and security institutions. The committee was given the responsibility to come with recommendations by keeping into account the Pakistan's position on the Kashmir issue, the UN resolutions on Kashmir and the Supreme Court of Pakistan's judgment on the possible provisional provincial status to GB. The committee was supposed to complete its mandate in two months' time and then the parliament was supposed to follow the recommendation and make an amendment in the constitution. But the committee never met in the allocated two months.

"No aurat-march next year", TLP chief, Azmat Khan, 19 March²³

The head of the Tehreek-i-Labbaik Ya Rasool Allah (TLYRA), Chief Dr Asif Ashraf Jalali has said that no obscenity would be allowed in Pakistan in the name of aurat-march. He said that aurat-march is meant for promoting obscenity. Aurat-march would spread vulgarity and destroy the future

America's on time withdrawal from Afghanistan Editorial, Jang, 30 March²⁴

Spokesperson of the Foreign Office has rejected any military solution to the Afghan conflict. Repeating the long standing position of Pakistan, the spokesperson said that the withdrawal of the American troops should take place according to the Doha agreement. Supreme Court of Pakistan upholds secret balloting in Senate polls rejecting Presidential Ordinance, Nadeem Malik Live, Samaa TV, 01 March²⁶ After much debate and discussion on the process of Senate elections, open or secret balloting, the Supreme Court of Pakistan has ruled that elections to the country's upper house of parliament, due tomorrow (3rd March), must be held under a secret ballot, effectively nullifying a government move to require they be held through open ballot. It also underlined that the election commission was empowered to take steps to ensure there was no corruption in the process. The court, however, ruled that secrecy of the ballot "is not absolute". This verdict is seen as a big blow to the PTI government, which had attempted to change the process for elections. Even one day before the elections allegations and counter allegations of horse trading between government and opposition is on. of secret balloting, the Supreme Court of Pakistan has rejected the Presidential Ordinance on open ballot in Senate elections brought by the PTI government. The PTI which initially did not expected that Supreme Court will go against them pointed out that they will follow the verdict of the SC on this matter. Maula Bakash Chandio pointed out that by alleging that the MPA's have been kidnapped in Sindh, the PTI want to make a case against the PPP. Prime Minister Imran Khan addresses the nation, ARY News, 04 March²⁷

Prime Minister Imran Khan addressed the nation after a meeting with his cabinet post the senate elections (after Hafiz Sheikh of the PTI lost the Islamabad seat to PDM candidate Yusuf Raza Gilani. The main focus of his speech was focused on exposing the opposition parties and how money was used in the senate elections. He again talked about the Riyaste Madina and how prophet Muhammad (SAW) used justice to serve his people pointing then in Pakistan there is no justice and powerful overshadow the weak. At last he informed that the PTI is going to the assembly and asking for 'vote of confidence' from his MPA's openly. Talal Chaudary pointed out that the PTI will not talk about NAB but when the ECP is not working in their favour they are attacking the institution. He informed that the present election commissioner is elected by the PTI government but still they are attacking him and the commission as a whole. Reforms should be there but the question is how. The mindset of the PTI is neither political nor parliamentary. The government makes an environment to work in the parliament, now under PTI it's defunct.
