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Chinese defence ministry criticizes Hegseth's speech at Shangri-La Dialogue

Ministry of National Defence of the People's Republic of China, June 1, 2025

China's Ministry of National Defence expressed strong dissatisfaction and firm opposition to the United States defence chief's speech at the Shangri-La Dialogue, which it said was filled with hegemonic logic and seriously provoked China's sovereign rights and interests while distorting China's policy positions. The ministry's spokesman Zhang Xiaogang made these remarks in a statement responding to the US defence secretary Pete Hegseth's speech at the high-profile security summit. The senior US official, in his speech, urged Asia-Pacific countries to increase their military spending to five percent of GDP to counter perceived threats from China in the region, including in the South China Sea and the Taiwan Strait. Zhang said the US is accustomed to using the Shangri-La Dialogue to create disputes, incite confrontation, and seek its own interests.

Chinese spying on Dutch industries 'intensifying': Dutch defence minister

Chinese efforts to spy on the Dutch are intensifying, with the focus on semiconductors, Dutch Defence Minister Ruben Brekelmans said. "The semiconductor industry, which we are technologically leading, or technology advanced, of course, to get that intellectual property - that's interesting to China," Brekelmans said in an interview on the sidelines of the Shangri-La Dialogue security meeting in Singapore. The Dutch military intelligence agency said in its annual report in April last year that Chinese spies have targeted the Dutch semiconductor, aerospace and maritime industries to try to strengthen China's armed forces.

It also has an edge in most other critical minerals, such as refined gallium, of which it controls 98.8 per cent of the output.

Months after the film hit cinema screens, military researchers in China revealed they were working on an artificial intelligence system designed to cut through exactly this type of underwater deception. In a peer-reviewed paper published in Chinese-language journal Command Control & Simulation in April, the team from the PLA Navy Armament Department and China State Shipbuilding Corporation said their system had unprecedented accuracy for torpedoes travelling at high speeds.

Chinese couple charged with attempt to smuggle noxious fungus into US

Federal prosecutors accused a postdoctoral research fellow at the University of Michigan and her boyfriend of seeking to bring a noxious fungus into the US to research it in the college laboratory, according to a criminal complaint announced. The alleged conduct was "of the gravest national security concerns", Jerome Gorgon, interim US attorney for the Eastern District of Michigan, said in a statement. The case is the latest by the US targeting Chinese nationals as Washington continues to focus on national security risks stemming from Beijing.

Study shows how robots replaced master workers in Chinese military drone factory

In a Beijing defence drone facility, a black carbon-fibre body frame sits on a workstation ready for drilling. The material is light and strong, but a fractional error in angle or positioning could affect stealth performance and lead to the scrapping of the entire part. Master technicians once performed this task – breath held, hands steady – relying on years of muscle memory. Despite their skill, human limitations capped the speed of production and kept costs high. That changed with a breakthrough from the China Academy of Space Technology (CAST) that has transformed the production line and reduced the margin of error for this task to a mere 0.04-0.1mm.

China's nuclear ambitions may face a slight setback from Washington's reported export restrictions on power plant components, but Beijing will press ahead with its construction drive and intensify efforts to develop home-grown technologies as its domestic reactors mature, analysts said. The Trump administration has reportedly suspended licenses for the export of some nuclear power generation equipment to China. "Nuclear power generation is one of the areas in which China has made obvious progress in swapping out imported tech and parts. America's curbs on

chips and chipmaking lithography machines have real teeth, but nuclear does not," said a researcher with a Shenzhen institute affiliated with the Chinese Academy of Sciences.

Taiwan indicts four suspected spies for China in case reaching presidential office

Taipei prosecutors indicted four people suspected of spying for China in a case that reached Taiwan's presidential office, seeking jail terms of more than 18 years. Democratically-governed Taiwan says it has faced heightened military and political pressure over the past five years or so from Beijing, which views the island as sovereign Chinese territory, a position Taipei's government rejects. In a statement, Taipei prosecutors said the four, all previously members of the ruling Democratic Progressive Party, had been indicted on espionage and other charges.

Nato chief says it must build Indo-Pacific ties to meet China's military challenge

Mark Rutte, Nato's secretary general, made his remarks at Chatham House in London, coinciding with the US-China ministerial-level trade negotiations in the city. "What we see at the moment is an enormous build-up in China of their military capabilities," Rutte, the former prime minister of the Netherlands, said. He noted that China "already has the world's largest navy, and this battle force is expected to grow to 435 ships by 2030. "China is also building up its nuclear arsenal, and it aims to have more than 1,000 operational nuclear warheads also by 2030," he added.
