China's Tiantuo satellite breakthrough enables global cargo surveillance: PLA scientists

Satellite technology that can track hundreds of millions of shipping containers around the world has been successfully tested by Chinese military scientists, in a huge leap forward in monitoring global supply chains. Developed by researchers with the National University of Defence Technology (NUDT) in Changsha, the technology centres on the Tiantuo-5 satellite – a compact, 80kg (175lb) orbiter launched in 2020. Recent trials have proved that China can gather real-time data from Internet of Things (IoT) sensors on cargo containers, including their location, internal conditions and even tamper alerts, according to a paper published earlier this year in the peer-reviewed Journal of NUDT.

Military delegates lose sway at China's signature political gathering

The size of the military delegation to China's rubber stamp parliament is falling and may shrink further, as leader Xi Jinping's purges cast a shadow over Beijing's biggest annual political event. The military delegation at the annual plenary session of the National People's Congress, will number 267, down from the 281 appointed in 2023. Fourteen have been removed because of corruption investigations. The military delegation — including representatives from the People's Liberation Army and the People's Armed Police — has suffered a greater reduction in size than any other provincial delegation, government or industry segment represented in the NPC and an advisory body, the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference (CPPCC), according to a Financial Times review of the delegate list, NPC announcements and official media reports.

The Chinese nuclear arsenal: More DoD nuclear threat minimization

The December 2024 Department of Defense (DoD) report on China's military capability stated that China had "...surpassed 600 operational nuclear warheads in its stockpile as of mid-2024." Thus, this number of "operational" nuclear warheads (left undefined) was already almost six months out of date. By the time the next report would normally appear (a year later), the DoD estimate of 600+ nuclear warheads would be about 18 months out of date. Yet, China is rapidly increasing its nuclear capability. Hence, much of the media will generally repeat the increasing out-of-date Pentagon number. Even worse, the DoD number is likely to be a considerable underestimate.

Beijing retaliates after Donald Trump imposes tariffs on top US trade partners

Donald Trump has imposed a swath of tariffs on Canada, Mexico and China, sparking retaliation from Beijing and sending stock markets lower as fears mount over a trade war. The White House also imposed an additional 10 per cent tariff on Chinese imports on top of a 10 per cent levy imposed last month. The moves drew an immediate response from Beijing, which said it would levy a 10-15 per cent tariff on US agricultural goods, ranging from soyabeans and beef to corn and wheat, from March 10. Lynn Song, greater China economist at ING, said Beijing's action — together with countermeasures last month — targeted a total of about 25 per cent of US exports to China, amounting to "a relatively muted response compared to the 10 per cent broad-based tariffs implemented by the US".

Recent revelations by defence industry researchers suggest that cutting-edge stealth technology aboard China's smooth-skinned stealth fighters may owe its resilience to a 3,000-year-old textile innovation: the art of silk jacquard weaving. Modern stealth aircraft, including the F-22 and F-35, rely on layered coatings to deflect radar signals. But these materials degrade rapidly under stress.

China will boost its defence spending by 7.2 per cent in 2025, the same as last year, according to a budget report. China will increase the minimum basic old-age benefits for rural and non-working urban residents by 20 yuan (\$2.75) per person per month, the budget report said. Nvidia is facing its first real competitor in China. US export controls, designed to cut off China's access to advanced chips and chipmaking gear, were supposed to ensure that no domestic rival could emerge. But the very sanctions meant to shut down China's chipmaking sector have instead fuelled it, accelerating the rise of an unexpected challenger: Huawei. The paradox is clear—had the US never imposed chip export bans, the Chinese conglomerate would have continued to rely on Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company for its chips. Chinese chips would have probably remained second-tier, reliant on foreign technology with little urgency to innovate.

CNOOC Limited announced that it has made a major breakthrough in the exploration of Paleozoic buried hills in the Beibu Gulf Basin. The Weizhou 10-5 oil and gas field is located in the Beibu Gulf of the South China Sea, with an average water depth of about 37 meters. Exploration well WZ10-5-1Sa encountered an oil and gas pay zone of 283 meters, with a total drilled depth of about 4,840 meters, it said. The test results indicate that the well produces about 13.2 million cubic feet of natural gas and about 800 barrels of crude oil per day, a major breakthrough in natural gas exploration in the granite buried hills in the Beibu Gulf Basin.

U.S. warships at sea or in port in the region would be under the same threat.

Regarding the last, the deployment was most likely a rehearsal run for the conduct of a seaborne missile strike on Australia, with China testing how it might most effectively launch missile strikes on Australian military facilities and critical national infrastructure.

China says rising military budget 'reasonable' in face of 'complex security environment'

China has said it will "vigorously" develop new combat capabilities as it confronts the world's "most complex security environment" amid the deepening rivalry with the United States. Speaking on the sidelines of the annual session of the National People's Congress, defence ministry spokesman Wu Qian defended this year's 7.2 per cent rise in military spending, as "reasonable and steady" and in line with economic growth. However, he admitted it remained an "arduous, uphill" battle to turn the People's Liberation Army (PLA) into a "world-class" military and hit its modernisation targets by 2027, the centenary of its founding. Wu said national defence spending would rise to 1.81 trillion yuan (US\$250 billion) this year, including 1.78 trillion yuan allocated at the central level.

China builds giant anti-hypersonic radar that can track every small and big Indian missile from 5,000 km away

China has established a powerful new radar system capable of monitoring India's ballistic missile launches in real-time. The Large Phased Array Radar (LPAR), deployed in Yunnan province, near the China-Myanmar border, significantly enhances Beijing's surveillance capabilities. The system, with an estimated range exceeding 5,000 km, can track missile tests conducted from India's Dr APJ Abdul Kalam Island off the Odisha coast, a key site for testing Agni-V intercontinental ballistic missiles and K-4 submarine-launched missiles. Indian security agencies have raised the alarm, warning the government that China's radar placement gives it an unprecedented intelligence advantage. "This system allows Beijing to detect, track, and analyse every missile test India conducts, giving them insights into our strategic capabilities," said a senior defence official.
